A message from An Cathaoirleach, Denis O'Callaghan

The start of my term as Cathaoirleach has been busy with my focus on community, housing, and climate change. I'm glad to have attended many openings and launches that benefit citizens across the County in these areas.

I was delighted to announce the return of the Dún Laoghaire St. Patrick's Day Parade, after a long absence. In partnership with Dún Laoghaire Business Association the return of the parade showcases the pride of the town and will unite the community and businesses in celebration.

Many of our parks and open spaces have benefited from upgrades and new amenities. The upgraded Myrtle Square, which I recently opened, is a catalyst for others to develop further climate-led projects. Blackrock Park's new adventure place space encourages children's active play and Apna Park's new pump track is multi-sport, capable of use by bicycles, skateboards and in-line skates, suitable for all ages. Work has also begun on a new library in Ballyogan. These facilities represent significant additions to our public spaces.

Housing continues to be one of my priorities. I'm pleased to have participated in several projects that deliver additional social housing properties. dlr Housing Construction completed 67 social homes in Ballyogan Square, which I opened in October. More recently I turned the sod in St. Laurence's Park, starting works on 88 new homes and a new Library. Work is progressing well on the 597 homes in Shanganagh. The Part V Scheme has added almost 100 properties and seven properties have been purchased via the Cost Rental Tenant-In-Situ Scheme with another 34 in conveyancing. There have been 424 allocations to date and I'm looking forward to future projects that allocate further properties to those on our housing lists.

In October I joined the Lord Mayor of Dublin City County, Mayor of South Dublin County Council and Mayor of Fingal County Council to launch our Draft Climate Action Plans. The public consultation for our Climate Action Plan 2024-2029 is now closed, we thank everyone for their submissions.

Looking forward to 2024, I will continue to champion projects for the betterment of the County and join the community in experiencing all that dlr has to offer.

A message from Chief Executive, Frank Curran

2023 saw a significant number of projects completed in housing, parks and community and planning is already underway to commence new projects next year. I would like to thank An Cathaoirleach and the elected members for all their assistance this year as we continue to create a progressive and vibrant county for all our citizens.

The Dundrum Local Area Plan has now come into effect and will include the provision of a new multi-functional, community, cultural and civic building in the heart of Dundrum and a new community focused public park on the Main Street.

Applications will open in December for the Climate Action Programme with €883,000 available for communities to carry out projects in their local area and we will be hosting a workshop in January where you can find out more.

Progress continues on residential delivery at Cherrywood with 4,468 units permitted, 1,064 completed and an additional 918 homes under construction ⁷⁷

Living Streets Dún Laoghaire which aims to make our local streets safer and greener is currently open for public consultation and I hope that you will share your views with us. A contractor is due to be appointed next year for the Glenamuck District Distributor Road with work to commence by Q1, 2024.

A design team will be appointed in the new year to produce a Dún Laoghaire Harbour Masterplan to guide the harbour into the future. In addition, we will commence the design and planning phase of the proposed National Watersports Campus.

In February 2024, we will partner with MosArt to host the forward-thinking ZEB Summit, which will facilitate important conversations on achieving net-zero buildings. This event will also showcase the certified passive housing scheme currently being constructed at Shanganagh Castle.

Progress continues on residential delivery at Cherrywood with 4,468 units permitted, 1,064 completed and an additional 918 homes under construction.

The Annual Budget process for 2024 is underway and is due for adoption by Council in December. This is an expansionary Budget that will provide an investment of €275m in services and supports for our residents, businesses and visitors next year.

There are so many events to choose from this year, including ice skating, santa visits and festive walks in our parks. I hope that you and your family will be out enjoying the festive season and I wish you all a very Happy Christmas & a peaceful new year.

Community Climate Action Programme opens for applications this December!

€883,000 available for communities to carry out projects in their local area that have a direct climate action impact.

Are you part of a community group interested in taking local climate action? Does your group have an idea for a project, big or small, that could not only benefit your local community but also make a positive impact in addressing climate change? If so, you may be interested in applying for funding from the new Community Climate Action Programme.

The Community Climate Action Programme is aimed at helping all communities to shape and build low carbon, sustainable communities that will contribute to Ireland and dlr's climate and energy goals. In cooperation with the Department of the Environment, Climate and Communications (DECC) we will provide funding to local communities to implement projects on a local level that have a direct climate impact. Under the Programme, we have been given an allocation of €883,000 for communities to carry out projects in their local area that have a direct climate action impact.



How will the programme work?

Proposed projects should address at least one, but preferably more than one of the following themes: community energy, travel, food and waste, shopping and recycling, as well as local climate and environmental action.

Possible projects could include retrofitting community buildings, installing water refill stations in your local sports club, establishing a repair hub, launching a bike or tool library, or initiatives that promote biodiversity.

The projects can include a suite of measures, not just one specific action and importantly, projects must have a direct climate impact including at least one, preferably more, of the following:

- Reducing greenhouse gas emissions
- Improving energy efficiency
- Increasing climate resilience (help adapt to the consequences of climate change)
- Assisting communities transition to low carbon and sustainable economy

The Community Climate Action Programme grants can fund up to 100% of all eligible costs for a successful project.

There are three levels of funding available:



Communities eligible for the scheme must be: not-for-profit; located in the operational area of Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council; registered with the Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown PPN or connected with other collectives such as the Wheel, Tidy Towns and /or a community group with Articles of Association or a Constitution, which hold an AGM, and for which approved minutes are available.

Private individuals, commercial undertakings, schools, and national level community or environmental organisations are NOT eligible for funding under this programme.

Possible groups that would be eligible could include sports clubs, resident associations, social enterprises, local Tidy Towns group, community centres, local charities, and local environmental groups.

Group or organisations who think they might be eligible are encouraged to get in contact with Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council's Community Climate Action Officer to discuss and develop their project ideas.

Applications for the programme will be open from December -until the end of February.

Community Climate Action Workshop

We will be delivering a workshop in mid-January to support community groups in Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown to develop proposals for local community action projects, based on expert advice and case studies.

If your group has an idea for an application or would like to collaborate with other local groups on a project, this workshop will support you with concise information about the programme and suggestions on how to create a strong project proposal.

This workshop will be delivered by Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council and Global Action Plan.

Important: Funding will be allocated to community organisations based on an appraisal of the application forms submitted to dlr and approval of the Minister. Community groups are expected to complete their climate action projects within 18 months of the approval date.

If your group has received more than 200K of State aid within the last three years, it may limit your eligibility under a state aid EU rule known as De Minimis. When you make an application, you will be advised as to whether you are affected by this State Aid rule that exists to avoid unfair competition in the marketplace.

Winter Service Plan & Operation

It's that time of the year again and we are gearing up for another winter service season. This year the season formally started in October and will finish at the end of April next year. Over the last number of months all associated plant and equipment e.g. gritters, vehicles, snow ploughs, etc. have received all of the necessary servicing in advance of the season commencing.

Our winter service operation is based in the Operations Centre in Ballyogan and this is where the salt barn is located which has a capacity of approximately 1,400 tonnes. All of the gritting trucks are based there, and following each gritting run, the trucks must be washed down in the dedicated wash down facilities to ensure that all the truck bodies are completely free of salt granules since they are highly corrosive.

Under this year's Winter Service Plan, we will treat approximately 220km of roads which represents approximately 28% of the overall road network within the County. The salting operation is carried out by deploying a fleet of 10 trucks with gritters each truck driving a specific, pre-defined route. Each route takes approximately two hours to complete and depending on the weather conditions, one or two gritting runs may be required, one at 7pm and another at 5am the following morning.

In addition to the work on the formalised gritting routes, additional work is carried out to assist residents on local roads in certain problematic rural areas. Salt boxes are provided in these areas for use by residents to assist with keeping minor roads open, and throughout the season these boxes are periodically topped up.

Snow clearance is also part of our winter plan and if necessary, most of the larger gritting trucks can be fitted with a snow plough. If we have a serious snow event occur during the winter, every effort will be made to clear the snow as quickly as possible.

Did you know that the electoral process has changed?

The Electoral Reform Act 2022 came into force last year. Even if you are already registered, you now should add your PPSN, date of birth and Eircode. This will allow your local authority to confirm your details and ensure the accuracy of the electoral register.

If you have changed address recently or someone in your household has moved out or turned 16, please update your details online or contact us directly.

A person may pre-register from the age of 16 years of age, however they will not be able to vote until they are 18.

Please keep footpaths and roads clear of obstructions

We are calling on householders and landowners/occupiers to please ensure that footpath and roadside hedges, overhanging trees, and bushes are cut and maintained so that all pedestrians can travel safely along footpaths and at junctions. This can also be an issue for cyclists along some routes where branches from trees overhang a cycle track and can be a problem on some routes for visually impaired persons as they are not expecting an overhead obstruction.



The season when hedge

cutting is permitted under the Wildlife Act is between the start of September and the end of February the following year.

Road safety is a shared responsibility; it's about us all doing our share to make our footpaths and roads safer and ensure the success of our Road Safety Strategy.

Vacant Homes Property Refurbishment Grant / Croí Cónaithe Grant

We have received over 100 applications to date for the Vacant Homes Property Refurbishment Grant (Croí Cónaithe) which aims to bring long term vacant homes back into residential use. In order for a property to be eligible, it must be vacant for at least two years. The Refurbishment Grant is up to the sum of \pounds 50,000, with a possible top-up of \pounds 20,000 if remedial structural works are required in the case of derelict properties.

Awards for Cost Rental & Older Persons Housing

This year, our Housing Department secured the overall national winner award at the Irish Council for Social Housing Community Housing Awards 2023 for cost rental housing at Enniskerry Road, Stepaside. Woodside is Ireland's first purpose-built cost rental development with 50 cost rental and 105 social homes, which are managed by Respond and Tuath Housing Associations. The homes at Woodside benefit from high quality design and landscaping with communal space, all of which were commended by the judges.

We were also proud to receive gold and silver awards at the All-Ireland Sustainability Awards for our innovative energy retrofit project in Beaufort Housing Development, Glasthule. The Gold award was received in the 'Energy Initiative / Project of the Year' category that aims to showcase examples of best practice within proactive energy management that will enable a more sustainable future energy system for all. The Silver award was received in the 'Housing / Building Initiative of the Year' category that aims to showcase the most innovative and inspiring green building, infrastructure and architectural projects developed over the past 24 months. In addition, we were the winners of the Residential Energy Upgrades Category in the SEAI 2023 awards. We partnered with SSE Airtricity Energy Services to upgrade Beaufort Housing which resulted in an energy reduction of up to 80% per unit per year.

The housing retrofit at Beaufort also won in the Local Authority Innovation category at the Excellence in Local Government Awards for the unique heat pump district heating system.

BUILDING INSPECTOR, CLERK OF WORKS, HOUSING DEPARTMENT

What do you have for breakfast?

Most mornings, I like to start my day off with a good breakfast of two poached eggs on brown toast. And of course, a pint of full fat milk.

What do you do?

I am a Clerk of Works in the Housing Department. This is a technical role which involves many different types of housing inspections. For example, we have received over 100 Croi Conaithe applications which gives up to €50,000-€70,000 to bring vacant homes back into use.

I recently joined the newly established affordable Housing team where we have quite ambitious goals and plans for the future delivery of housing in the county.

What is your typical workday like?

No one day is like another. There is a great mix of office work and being out and about doing inspections. I like to be in the office early in the morning, but this varies as we tend to work around people's availability when we do inspections.

Recently, dlr put out a call to participate in competitive dialogue to deliver social and affordable housing. We received a large number of submissions and I look forward to playing my part in this process to help ramp up housing delivery within the county.

What is the most difficult part of your job?

People I meet every day have real concerns about the future housing needs of their families. While it brings home the situation the country is in, it is also a reminder that my work and the work of my colleagues in Housing has a tangible effect. It is a constant motivator.

What is the most rewarding part of your job?

I have always enjoyed meeting people, you get a real sense of what is happening in the county.

I also enjoy working as part of a highly motivated team where a strong emphasis is put on problem solving and with a good attitude. I think attitude trumps everything and that's what our team has put a focus on. If you apply the right attitude and application to anything you have good foundations for success, which in our case relates to the delivery of new homes.

Favourite place to visit?

I love the quarry in Dalkey, it is so steeped in history, you can almost hear the echoes of the past as they brought stone down the Metals to build the piers. Looking over the harbour from our canteen is always lovely. I was lucky enough to live in Rome for a number of years, my family and I love to go back when we can. I also love to visit my small hometown in County Limerick, it is nearly as glamourous as Rome.

Active Travel: A Year in Review

Construction completed on: Rock Road, Brewery Road, Wyattville Road, Clonskeagh Road. Schemes under construction including: Deerpark, Deansgrange Road, Love our Laneways (Pearse Drive), Stillorgan Park Road (construction commencing Q1 2024).

Schemes completing detailed design and preparing for tender: DLR Central, Seafield Safe and Quiet Streets, SRTS Bundle 1, Taney Road to N11, Living Streets: Coastal Mobility Route, Living Streets: Blackrock.

Planning permission achieved: Living Streets: Blackrock, Rochestown Avenue and Deansgrange Cycle Route.

Schemes currently going through public consultation: Living Streets: Dún Laoghaire.

Schemes at pre consultation stage: SRTS Bundle 2, DLR Connector, Cherrywood to Shankill Greenway, Cabinteely Greenway, Dodder Greenway.



Rock Road Sustainable Transport Improvement Scheme:

This project (which recently won the Irish Construction Industry Award for Civil Construction Project of the Year) consisted of the construction of a two-way cycle lane at Rock Road, drainage, landscaping including rain gardens and SuDs features, re-surfacing, line marking and the application of high friction surfacing.

The project encourages a safe and free-flowing cycle facility connecting to recent projects like the Blackrock Park upgrades and the Coastal Mobility Route. Delivering safe, segregated cycle facilities along the Rock Road / Merrion Road.

As a climate conscious County, we are always looking at ways to reuse materials to minimise waste. In this scheme we used a machine to essentially 'microwave' parts of the old road surface to reseal it and avoid having to replace it, the scheme also retrofitted a rain garden into the central median, so, during periods of rainfall, the surface run-off will flow across the road and through the gaps formed within the road kerb and into the Rain Garden, which consists of a moisture retentive yet free draining substrate, which in turn, irrigates the pollinator friendly ground cover planting mix. It also has the benefit of softening the road infrastructure by greening the area with tree and other planting.

Clonskeagh Road Project:

The completion of the Clonskeagh Road (UCD to River Dodder scheme) is an important element of the wider NTA plan to create a continuous high quality cycle lanes from Sandyford to the City Centre and reflects ongoing collaboration between ourselves and UCD to improve the cycle network in the vicinity of the University.

The scheme has improved facilities for pedestrians and cyclists along Clonskeagh Road from UCD to the County boundary and the Dodder Greenway. It has provided the following features:



- Enhanced facilities for cyclists on both sides of Clonskeagh Road including the provision of 2.0m wide cycle tracks along most of the route.
- Enhanced transitions for cyclists through junctions.
- Upgraded bus stops.
- Upgrade of pedestrian crossings along the route.
- Reconfiguration of the junction of Clonskeagh Road and Beech Hill Road.
