

This month, the new Ballyogan Library opened at the Samuel Beckett Civic Campus. The new library, spanning 1,300 square metres over two floors, is a welcoming space for all in the community to enjoy, study, read, relax and participate in events. The library features a dedicated teen area, cubbie sensory hub, events space, music studio, creative room, and accessible services. With a variety of study spaces, free internet and Wi-Fi, PCs, printing, copying, and scanning facilities, Ballyogan Library has something for everyone.

As part of the development of this new library, we engaged with the community to inform the design and layout of the library building. We have taken on board many of those suggestions. This is the first library in Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown with a dedicated sensory space, dedicated teen area, music studio and creative room. Everything in the new library is brand new, so lots of lovely new books and other items to borrow.

Initially, Ballyogan Library will be open Monday to Friday from 9.30am to 5pm, with plans to expand to full library hours in the coming weeks. For the most up-to-date information, please visit libraries.dlrcoco.ie.

We're also supporting our local economy with the 2025 Ratepayers Support Grant, offering 8% to 14% relief for eligible businesses with rates under €20,000—apply via direct debit

by May 1st for automatic benefits. Shopfront improvement grants of up to  $\notin$ 5,000 are available too, so business owners, seize this chance to spruce up! Meanwhile, a gentle reminder to householders: please trim back overhanging hedges to keep our pathways safe and accessible for everyone.

Spring brings new community spaces, like the multi-sport buildings at St. Thomas Fields (Phase 2), featuring a gym, studio, and athletics facilities, fostering health and inclusion. Fernhill Park & Gardens will unveil a woodland adventure play space, co-designed with local schools, blending nature and fun. The historic kiosk at Blackrock Park is being lovingly restored as a tearoom, while Finsbury Park in Dundrum will soon open an inclusive playground with swings, a scooter track, and more.

Dublin Climate Action Week 2025 takes place in Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown from 12-18 May, offering workshops, expert talks, energy saving advice and community showcases. This collaborative event, led by the four Dublin Local Authorities, highlights local climate initiatives and supports the Council's Climate Action Plan 2024-2029.

These initiatives reflect our shared commitment to a thriving, connected county we can all be proud of.

It has been a busy start to the year with the opening of several new services, including the new Ballyogan Library, the Mounttown Boxing Club building, and the restored Blackrock Park Historic Kiosk. # Ratepayers Support Grant for 2025

The Council's Budget for 2025 retained numerous Grants and Supports for Businesses including the Ratepayers Support Grant for eligible ratepayers whose rates bill is less than €20,000. Grant payments are graduated depending on the level of rates payable and the grant varies from 8% to 14%.

To qualify for the Ratepayers Support Grant you must be currently paying by direct debit, pay in full by 1st May or sign up to pay your rates by Direct Debit prior to that date.

If you sign up to pay by direct debit and subject to meeting the other terms and conditions of the scheme, your grant will be applied automatically to your account this year by reducing your November and December direct debt payment. Please scan the QR code for full details.

# Householders are responsible for cutting back hedges outside their boundaries

Overgrown hedges and other vegetation that overhang a public footway can cause problems for visually impaired persons but also for walkers and runners. Large branches overhanging roads can cause a danger to motorists, especially to drivers of high-sided vehicles such as lorries or buses.

Section 70(2) (a) of the Roads Act 1993 provides that, "the owner or occupier of land shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that a tree, shrub, hedge or other vegetation on the land is not a hazard or potential hazard to persons using a public road and that it does not obstruct or interfere with the safe use of a public road or the maintenance of a public road". Thus, there is legal duty on landowners or occupiers of land to ensure hedges and trees on their property are well maintained such that they are not encroaching beyond their boundary line.

Overgrown hedges and trees encroaching onto a public footway from private land can force people, particularly wheelchair users and parents with prams, into the road, putting their safety at risk. Landowners and occupiers are required to fell, cut, trim back, or remove such hedges and trees to prevent them from becoming a hazard to persons or property on the road. Adequate traffic management should be provided when cutting back such vegetation and Council should be notified before works commence.

Hedge cutting operations should only be undertaken outside the critical nesting period of 1st March to 31st August. The only exception is if there are road safety implications. The Roads Act states that liability for damage or injury resulting from such hazards will rest with the landowner/occupier, and Notices may be served on those who do not comply with their statutory obligations.

If made aware of any problems caused by overhanging vegetation, the Council will write to the landowner asking them to cut it back. Details of overhanging vegetation or hedges should be emailed to info@dlrcoco.ie

#### Multi-Sport Buildings at St. Thomas Fields (Phase 2)

In partnership with Dundrum South Dublin Athletics, we are progressing with phase 2 of the multisport campus at St. Thomas Fields at Tibradden Road, Co. Dublin as a satellite amenity to Marlay Park. The phase 2 development includes two new buildings comprising a multi-sport building and a track enclosure building. The multi-sport building will include a foyer, gym, flexible studio/hall space, a gathering area for the clubs, a café, changing rooms, office space and consultation rooms. The track enclosure will include a strength and conditioning room, a 60m sprint track with multiple other athletics facilities including long jump, triple jump and high jump. The buildings will be highly flexible in order to maximise occupancy and facilitate multiple use.

The project aims to support the clubs and local community to encourage an active lifestyle and to improve health and well-being. The facility will be highly inclusive while also supporting improved performance and development from its users. The project is supported by the Large-Scale Sport Infrastructure Fund through the Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht and Media.

#### Fernhill Park and Gardens Play Space

A new woodland adventure play space is being developed in Fernhill Park & Gardens in line with the masterplan for the park. The concept was developed with local schools as part of Creative Ireland's Cruinniú na nÓg, which took place in Fernhill. At this event, designers, engaged with the local Primary Schools to develop the concept and design of a Woodland Adventure Play facility at Fernhill.

The design of the play space will encourage interaction with the surrounding natural environment, as the play items weave routes through the existing trees. It is intended that the design will draw heavily on the surrounding environment, and will provide an array of natural play items, including logs, trees, and boulders, to enhance the experience for children. A large tower to the rear of the play space will create a highly visible feature, with a high play offering. This will serve as a beacon, to attract children in the surrounding area, through the play space. An enclosed area, with age-appropriate play, will also be provided for younger children,

We intend to create destination play space, appropriate for a Regional Park, that offers an inclusive, child-centred, adventurous play space, where children and young people can play, explore, create, and socialise, in a woodland setting.

Through its phased and carefully planned development as a regional park, Fernhill Park & Gardens is now served by a 100-space carpark, toilet facilities, a multi-use sports grass playing pitch, calisthenics, and a 400m running path. The Park also includes bicycle parking, extensive seating, a dogs off leash area, a network of pedestrian paths, historic gardens, sustainably managed woodlands and pastures high in biodiversity.

#### **Blackrock Park Historic Kiosk Renovation**

The ongoing renovation of Blackrock Park is guided by the vision set down in the Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council Blackrock Park Masterplan 2020. The renovation of the historic kiosk is a key element of the fabric of the park and the restoration is a pivotal aspect of the overall masterplan.

The kiosk is part of the original layout of the park and, along with the bandstand in the lower space, forms an important set piece. The park was built on reclaimed land cut off from the sea by the construction of the train line in the 1830's. Work on the park began in the 1870's and was completed in the 1880's.

From its opening in the 1890's the kiosk originally functioned as a tearoom and then transitioned to residential use from the 1910's up until the 1970's. A park staff member and their family lived in the building. Since the 1970's the building has been vacant and without a use, it has suffered from steady decline.

We have procured a Conservation architecture led design team to oversee the renovation and conservation of the kiosk. The structure itself is a unique design with a distinctive roof profile and tudor revival aesthetic. It sits in a very prominent location, highly visible from passing traffic on the Rock Road and commanding the attention from Park users as well as Dart commuters.

The structure is a timber frame which was in an advanced state of decay and at risk of collapse. The conservation ethos is to retain as much of the historic timbers as possible, reinstating its character and bringing it back into use. The building will be restored and re-purposed as a park tearoom, featuring an open plan arrangement with integrated benches along the south and north perimeter, serving counter, a storage/ utility room and a staff toilet. An external verandah space includes a wraparound bench.

Works are part-funded by the Historic Structures Fund 2024-2025 (Dept. of Housing Local Government and Heritage.)



New and Refurbished Play Spaces

We are making significant strides in enhancing play opportunities across the county through our Play Policy (2023-2028). Seven playgrounds were selected for refurbishment in 2024 which included Belarmine, Marlay Park Woodland Playground, The Gallops, Soldiers & Sailors, Springhill, and Hyde Park. Additionally, Deerpark's existing play space has been upgraded to incorporate more inclusive and natural play elements.

Looking ahead to 2025, refurbishment projects are set to take place at Carysfort Park (Blackrock), Pearse Park (Sallynoggin), Clonmore Park (Stillorgan), and Patrick Doyle Park (Milltown). Public consultations for these projects will commence in the near future.

Exciting new projects at Clonkeen Play Space and Meadowbrook/Ludford Play Space recently completed public consultation in January 2025, with construction expected to begin in Q3 and finish by Q4 of 2025.

These projects highlight our continued commitment to creating safe, accessible, and engaging play spaces for children and families across the county, reinforcing the value of play in community well-being.

#### **New Boxing Pavilion**

A new boxing pavilion to the rear of the community facility at Mounttown has recently been completed and will support local clubs and other groups to achieve their goals, foster a community spirit and improve the health and wellbeing of the people who access them.

The design approach was to place the taller boxing training area running east west across the rear of the site and place the lower support facilities also running east west, across the front of the site. The pavilion includes a large flexible hall space at a height that allows the introduction of clear storey lighting and natural ventilation where it then joins with the smaller rooms consisting of the changing rooms, toilets, storage and kitchenette/medical room.

The facility was constructed in a previously used carpark and the removal of these carparking spaces aligns with the objectives of our Climate Action Plan 2024-2029 which seeks to review opportunities to reallocate public parking spaces to alternative public amenity uses.

# Marlay Park Turns 50: Celebrating Half a Century of Community and Green Space

This year marks a special milestone for Marlay Park as we celebrate 50 years since its transformation from private Marlay Demesne into the beloved public park it is today. The park, previously home to the La Touche, Tedcastle and Love families, was officially opened by An Taoiseach, Liam Cosgrave, on June 27, 1975. To commemorate this historic occasion, we have planned a series of events in May/June for visitors to enjoy. From movies to outdoor activities and exhibitions, there is something for everyone to celebrate the legacy of Marlay Park.

Marlay Park has been a vital green space for the rapidly growing suburbs of Dublin since its acquisition in 1972. The park has undergone various developments over the years, including the restoration of Marlay House and the introduction of sports facilities and recreational areas. Marlay Park continues to adapt and respond to the needs of future generations, as outlined in the Marlay Park Masterplan. # **Hybrid Power Generator wins** Best Energy Smart Initiative at All Ireland Awards





dlr Architects have been awarded the best Energy Smart Initiative at the All-Ireland Community and Council Awards for their successful implementation of a hybrid power system at the St. Laurence's Apartments and Library Construction site in Stillorgan. This groundbreaking project, in partnership with Clancy Construction and JTM Energy, is set to bring about a reduction of approximately 70% in carbon emissions over the lifespan of the construction project.

The initiative showcases the commitment of dlr Architects to sustainability goals in Ireland, so that the construction stage now joins with the project's design as a sustainability exemplar. By introducing a hybrid power system consisting of a single generator and a high-capacity storage battery, in lieu of three generators, the construction site is able to meet its electricity demands efficiently and responsibly. This innovative solution not only ensures a reliable power supply but also significantly decreases fossil fuel usage and environmental impact.

We are working in partnership with Dublin City Council, Fingal County Council and South Dublin County Council on Gaeilge 365 which aims to create natural opportunities and ideas for people to bring Irish into their daily lives. According to Census 2022, of those aged 3 years and older, 162,400 people could speak Irish in Dublin City however opportunities to actively speak it are decreasing. Gaeilge 365 aims to make the Irish language more accessible and engaging by utilising the broad range of services the County Councils offer to the public, to create some of these opportunities.

Efforts are also ongoing to implement bilingual signage and public notices throughout the county. This not only enhances the visibility of the Irish language but also ensures that public services are accessible to Irish speakers. Part of this effort are the amendment of incorrect street names. If you see an incorrect street name or have a query on one, please let us know via scanning the below QR code.

### dlr staff profile



#### Tim Ryan **OPERATIONS MANAGER** DÚN LAOGHAIRE HARBOUR

#### How do you start your day?

I have a 1-hour train commute from Rathdrum each morning. I read a lot, so I generally take that opportunity to dive into whatever book I'm into at the time. Once I land in Dún Laoghaire, it's coffee time!

#### What do you do?

I manage Dún Laoghaire Harbour (with a team of really excellent colleagues)! I've been in this role for the past 13 years now, initially with the former Harbour Company, and since 2018 with Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council. We look after everything from maintenance and cleansing, to shipping, property management, infrastructure repair, events, filming, port security and a whole raft of other areas within the Harbour.

#### What is your typical workday like?

One of the aspects of my role that I really like is that no two days are the same. I spend a lot of time in meetings, some of which can be really interesting, some less so! Aside from that, I could be looking at our daily operations or perhaps reviewing an ongoing project. There is always something going on around the Harbour, and I generally meet someone interesting as I am travelling around it.

#### What is the most difficult part of your job?

I think navigating the public service! Whether it's a procedural matter that we have to comply with, to perhaps a grant process which needs to be overseen, I sometimes find bureaucracy difficult. I have learnt however that compliance is the only approach to achieving anything significant, so we get on with it.

#### What is the most rewarding part of your job?

I really enjoy collaborating on projects or initiatives. This can be with our own staff to solve a particular problem that were having, with other Council sections to bring about a project or improvement or with many other stakeholders on events, future plans, projects or sometimes just to form a joint understanding of where we all see a project going. There is a fantastic community within the Harbour who have the best interests of the harbour at heart. The National Watersports Campus project is a real collaboration, not just between the Council, Irish Sailing and Diving Ireland, but with all the Harbour users, and hopefully some new ones that we can attract through an improvement in facilities. I think that this project will be transformative in terms of access the water.

We are currently undertaking a Harbour Masterplan which will involve a lot of collaboration. I am excited to see what will evolve from this process, and how a future vision for this amazing place will look. I always say that we, both the Council and myself, are just the current custodians of this wonderful amenity. Our time will pass, but the Harbour will remain, and hopefully in a better condition that it was when we first arrived here.

#### Favourite place?

At home! I live up the hills in rural Co. Wicklow, and it feels a bit like a sanctuary (except during a storm!). My family is very important to me, so I endeavour to be available and spend as much time with them as I can. Hopefully it will pay off and my children will fork out for a nice nursing home when the time comes!

The unique programme is provided by Jacinta Barrins. Jacinta is a retired United Nations Diplomat, where her work focused on the environment and climate.


